[participant]: Thank you, Marianne, for inviting one of my OTHER favorite explorers of these matters of the heart,

[participant]: I hear nothing, gogged in 3 times, no audio.

[participant] : [participant], did you check your volume settings?

[participant]: Stephen, you might also check your audio output settings under the Volume tab at the bottom; click on the ^

[participant]: The pastor Barbara is referencing is Scott Black Johnston of Fifth Avenue Presbyterian. His new book is Elusive Grace: Loving Your Enemies While Striving for God's Justice.

[participant]: The local church is emptying of money but often that's not true of the diocesan coffers. The Southern Ohio Diocese is flush with money, only behind NYC.

[participant]: For current "Evangelical' and "Biblical Literalists" appear (or are) growing and we don't seem to have a bridge between them and the view you have of described Christianity seems to be a dwindling viewpoint. What think ye?

[participant]: For a good example of oving your neighbor I strongly suggest seeing the new Tom Hanks movie, A Man Called Otto. It a movie about one mans journey from depression to loving his neighbors. It is a loving move that addresses what we face in growing old.

[participant]: What is the shift you have seen in your life/career?

[participant]: I wonder if you know about the movement called Wild Church? Creation and Celtic-centered, they mostly meet outdoors.

[participant]: When I worked for Quakers I trained in Godly Play. Now, as a story worker, I am working on a suite of stories called Hidden Voices that radically retell some moments in the new testament from the possible perspective of women, children and others. They are written to be told out loud.

[participant]: Sacred Nature-Karen Armstrong; Sacred Earth, Sacred Soul-John Philip Newell [participant]: When I first came to an Episcopal church (from more evangelical years) I saw in the procession, the story played out for those who historically didn't read or were illiterate. The different seasons and symbols suddenly made sense. My eyes were opened after an upbringing very anti-Catholic. So wonderful!



[participant] : ...put when we only feel the "full body experience" can lead to a road that denies the humanity of Gay people and how repenting and "believing in the "Lord Jesus" can be destructive of "Love"

[participant]: Where are the blacks & other than white anglo saxons? I see only one?

[participant]: Seeking consensus is perhaps a desire for control sometimes?

[participant]: Church of the Wild, Victoria Loorz

[participant]: Yes, [participant].

[participant]: What do you think of the reality the eucharist instead of a joyful loving experience is a penitential reinforcement of the evil of humanity

[participant]: I turned 80 this years—the same age as "old" people.

[participant] : Being 92 is cool

[participant]: Isn't it better to live your life for now rather than for later in heaven?

[participant]: My dad died a few weeks before his 75th birthday. I was relieved to reach 75! [participant]: To keep up my gratitude, I've adopted a Bhutanese practice: 5x daily, say, "I am going to die." Keeps me sobered!

[participant]: BBT, Just wait until you hit your 80s. I find that keeping your sense of humor will keep you alive.

[participant]: Metaphysics without practice is a reductionist illusion, void of interconnection and a non-dualist reality. Repentance is a change of mind. Practice is born of a larger worldview. Metaphysics and practice are interdependence and is a dance of evolution.

[participant]: It seems the more I let go of, the more alive I become.

[participant]: If this is all we get, then live every single moment. If this is it, I won't know anyway. Pascal's Wager.

[participant]: Eternal life - I'd say that it is not the future but rather the past that still inhabits us. When I hear Marianne talk about Marcus, he is still present. His memory is present. I always think that eternal life is like Beethoven,

[participant]: Beethoven is dead but he lives on! [participant]: Goosebumps. Well said, Marianne. [participant]: I think you're articulating it VERY well!



[participant]: I've been disabled since age 8 mos. due to polio. Feeling worthy of this life is so incredibly hard for me. I only seem to feel worthy when I reach out to love my God and my neighbors.

[participant]: Wonderful, Marianne, thank you! I'm 79 now.

[participant]: Jesus also talked mostly about this life.

[participant]: Why has neither of you mentioned Gratitude in relation to end-of-life?!

[participant]: We live on after death only In the memory of those whose life we touched.

[participant]: Thank you for saying what my heart has known

[participant]: as Marcus said, "we die into God".

[participant]: Hello Everyone from Portland, OR Connie

[participant]: Arsenic and Old Lace

[participant]: I think "this" is it in terms of our human-ness, because we are humans. But

somehow, I think God will always "be". I, Filomena, will die, but God will continue, always.

[participant]: When I die and my body is transformed into its essential elements they will remain

in a new way. So in that sense I will have eternal life and I won't know what "I am doing".

[participant]: With all you have said, which I agree with, how do we keep our churches alive? What will motivate people to gather as a community? For me, it is my lifeline, as it is for many

[participant]: Barbara sounds like an Agrarian. I wonder if she has read Wendell Berry? Local, communitarian, neighborly connection

[participant]: Question for them: is caring for rescue dogs of value as opposed to "people"?

[participant]: Friendship between people has nothing to do with the religion of either of them.

[participant]: Best conversation ever!

[participant]: My take-away: love ("God") is in the details.

[participant]: Great discussion. Thank you both. MJR

[participant]: Thank you! At 79, it is enough to invite a friend to share a pot of soup.

[participant]: Note: okay to be "resting in green pastures." No need to achieve, just all your God to love you

[participant]: We get right back to the simple messages of Jesus, don't we? Not intellection scholarship or arguments. Just be present before God, to yourself, to others in your life.



[participant]: Really great conversation! I loved the book Holy Envy and loved the discussion between two very thoughtful grounded women

[participant]: I self-published The God Nobody Knows, but distribution is a figment of my imagination. Publicists want to help, but only for a significant investment.

[participant]: Thank you so much from a little island of the West Coast of Scotland, your books have been so very helpful, the doubts and affirmation I have needed questioning so much on my Presbyterian faith. Blessings.

[participant] : What island?

[participant]: Addressing an individual without a systemic approach denies the interconnection of reality. Jesus also overturned tables in the temple.

[participant]: Or shall we challenge to see God as a parent and creator?

[participant]: Wonderful session... thank you!

[participant]: I was sitting in a worship experience in a church that would close and said to myself "I will miss this" and heard a voice, not mine, say "So will I."

[participant]: Susie you sound like an OT Prophet

[participant]: Thank you all speakers and questioners for vulnerability. Touches me on a deep level.

[participant] : [participant], Your experience is very striking. Thanks.

[participant]: Seems to me that we may indeed be following the commandment "Love your neighbor as yourself" and that is why culture/society is so messed up ... we love ourselves horribly and then we love our neighbors the same. When we can see our own worth, we will see our neighbor's.

[participant] : [participant], As a devoted member of a small struggling church that may not survive, your comment Brings tears to my eyes. Thank you.

[participant]: Christian pagan. Aren't we all?

[participant]: Susie, loving is loving.

[participant]: Hello everyone, I graduated from a pioneering interfaith Seminary called the Chaplaincy institute that supports the pluralism discussed...what a gift at age 68. Love the opportunity of its expansion in the midst of this conversation.

[participant]: I'm a Pagan who fell in love with the Methodist church. Now I'm a pastor.



[participant]: Barbara, I hope you know how important you have been in my life. Your comments on late life and the falling away of things we work so hard to achieve strike me where I am at the moment. Thank you.

[participant]: My church is highly influenced by Wendell Berry. We have his Mad Farmer Manifesto hanging in our building. We definitely need an icon!

[participant]: There are so many facets to God/Jesus and different aspects speak to me depending on where I am at in life. All are valid.

[participant] : People seek porpose in Life from outside of who they are but it only comes from within.

[participant]: States of heart as well...

[participant]: Loved this conversation. Love Barbara's books—all have had meaning for me. So glad to finally "meet" her in person.

[participant]: Doing without beliefs is a dualistic. reductionistic and non-interdependence.

[participant]: I see eternal life like a genetic issue. Our ancestor live in us in their genes and we shall do the same for the future generations if we did have the privilege of having offspring(s). Perhaps a little too matter of fact, but it helps me to conceive it.

[participant] : For both: What does Marcus's statement "I die unto God and hope for the best" mean for you?

[participant]: Barbara, you'd love the song by Iris Dement called "Let the Mystery Be."

[participant]: God is Eternal, he made us and said we were good. I do not believe He will let us go for an eternity when we die. We will always be in His presence. I don't know what that will look like but it really isn't important at this point.
