[Participant] : Scripture uses the words such as "Lord' and 'King.' What words would work in the 21st century?

[Participant] : Bishop Spong always spoke of "God" as an experience, not a "Being".

[Participant] : How do we change the coming to terms with risk?

[Participant] : is it possible to that our concept of God evolves in direct relation to the evolution of human consciousness? Can we let go of the perceived safety and security



of "knowing"...of the need to be "right", for the openness, newness and vast possibility of mystery...of "unknowing"?

[Participant] : Could that be "longing"?

[Participant] : GOD = Final Reality, The Way Life Is, The unknown, unknown, The Ground of Being

[Participant] : Christianity: What needs to change? 1. The Bible is a collection of stories with meaning not a literal historical document. 2. The Eucharist is a mystery of Christ's presence not a physical presence of body and blood. 3. Acknowledge the Creed's as historical documents. 4. Being Christ like is what needs to be not believing in Christ. 5 God is not a being. 6. Heaven and Hell are states of mind not places you go. 7. Salvation is not an escape plan. A heavenly escape plan prevents serious consideration for improving life as we know it on earth. 8 The only life you have is the one you are experiencing in the present moment. 9.

[Participant] : Bishop Spong offers that self consciousness transcending into universal consciousness (god) is the key to "living fully, loving wastefully, and being all we can be."

[Participant] : A voyage of discovery into the unknowable.

[Participant] : Isn't something always "yet to come"?

[Participant] : Does God know it?

[Participant] : Infinite possibility. Could that be the nature of God?

[Participant] : "Jesus is magic" (Sarah Silverman)

[Participant] : Jesus is human, consequently, diviine

[Participant] : "love one another" once you master that you can worry about the rest

[Participant] : I like God's Dream rather than "God's Kingdom"

[Participant] : Verna Dozier's book -"The Dream of God: a Call to Return".

[Participant] : "A better future for a future that will not be ours" I like that!

[Participant] : Aren't difficulties the path of growth?

[Participant] : Well, the future will not be better unless we as individuals and as societies face the truth and reality of our time. As long as our attention is diverted by self and material motives or a belief in the greatness or evil of various nations, we will miss what is going on now on this planet, and what we can and will do to save it..

[Participant] : How do we be a good ancestor?

[Participant] : Native cultures teach to think of the seventh generation - much to teach us on that.

[Participant] : Can we let go of Christianity and instead embrace Christ?

[Participant] : In the future, humans will likely create new difficulties that we have to navigate ... The difficulties never go away. We need to keep looking for ways to find the joy of living / beautiful of the people & world around us in spite / in the midst of all



the rest.

[Participant] : Beautiful presentation, Marianne...

[Participant] : I think Marianne's articulation is terrific.

[Participant] : Your articulation is extremely cogent and effective

[Participant] : The mystery of glory is experienced in the struggle, the vulnerability and uncertainty. This is the challenge and the risk.

[Participant] : What if we are an invasive species just trying to survive, creating the path forward, and the only way to survive is to Love One Another?

[Participant] : Juist a beginning thought -- if neutrinos are attracted to matter, then in a big, metaphysical sense, are we attracting neutrinos to our planet? What does that mean for us?

[Participant] : What if Heaven is part of our existence here, in the physical?

[Participant] : Do we need to let go of Christianity's idea os exclusivity?

[Participant] : Barbara Crafton's book, The Also Life, posits that "the afterlife" is present now!

[Participant] : new interpretations will challenge the institutional Church, and I imagine that will evoke a violent reaction. Cui bono? who will benefit from change and who or what will "lose"?

[Participant] : In our Lord's Prayer, the phrase "Thy Kingdom come, Thy Will be done on earth as it is in Heaven", we affirm that as those who follow Jesus, there will be challenges and changes that urge us to take risks.

[Participant] : Sometimes we are uncertain about the future, just listening helps. Listening to each other, listening to the peace, listening to the pain and not passing judgement but just listen. You can't make change without understanding.



[Participant] : Jesus reiterates that there will be challenges in the Beatitudes.

[Participant] : My first time here. I LOVE the guidelines.

[Participant] : What is something that I can do now that entails some personal risk or challenge to improve the future for future generations? Be a prophet and challenge the status quo?

[Participant] : I find that I'm urged to gratefully shed much of the past while also, at the same time, hunger voraciously for the future MORE. Grateful, not in getting rid of but in what the shedded provided in the past.

[Participant] : What I see in Jesus is the emphasis of relationship: relationship between each other, with each other, and with God

[Participant] : Even in the CREED we recognize that we believe in the "seen" and the "unseen." WOW. That opens up so much. That isn't addressed very often. It is almost like the ignored hidden genetic trigger waiting for it to be turned on.

[Participant] : To think deeply; to act compassionately, to give ourselves permission within Christianity to say we don't know what the future holds and also to dare to imagine a better future. A future for others to live into.

[Participant] : Thanks for the reminder of language that is not of words, relating it to compassion, patience, listening, and just being....inviting imagination. resting in a larger field ?! especially WITH others :)

[Participant] : What to do? Inventory your own skills, talents, abilities, resources, passions...pick one and pursue it! That is the Creator working in and thru and with you.

The future: that in which we live and move and have our peing (MAB)

[Participant] : One small Effort per day for advocacy e.g Encourage those discouraged, help persude fence sitters. contact people in power with a simple direct communication

[Participant] : Agree with [Participant]. I'm being reminded of the call to start with myself — what are my gifts — then turn to the needs of the world in order to offer them in a particular way (Howard Thurman), unique to me.
