[Participant]: My question would be, How does theoretic discourse relate to spiritual experience and sensibility? "imagination" may be a dangerous word int that it does suggest "fantasy".

[Participant]: Are the thoughts of Pierre Teilhard de Chardin aligned with Theopoetics?

[Participant]: But isn't there inequality, too? If we say we're all equal, doesn't that negate the fact that some really are more powerful and competent than others?

[Participant]: In response to Ed Wales - Not knowledgeable enough to make an evaluation of the work of Teilhard, but there are interesting quotes of comments by scientists in Wikipedia -https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Pierre\_Teilhard\_de\_Chardin#Evaluations\_by\_scientists. From looking at these, it seems to me that it is difficult for scientist who simply deny the existence of God but somehow cannot also admit the existence of the concept of God or even the need for



some sort of spirituality. I remember studying some of the work of Teilhard when I was in secondary school in the late 60s ans seeing Le Phénomène Humain and Le Milieu Divin as poetry but also written by someone who was clearly challenged by the Vatican for developing his ideas.

[Participant]: The neocortex suffers from the delusion that it is the whole mind. It isn't. All the other faculties, sensation, perception, instinct, intuition, valuation, memory, imagination, curiosity, etc (we don't know all their names), these things present the world to reason. Reason finds a place for all of that in its map of reality that makes sense, or alters the map, or discards what doesn't fit. We live meaning into the words -this is me making sense of theopoetics.
