[Participant]: Please feel free to share your thoughts in the chat as well as raising your hand to speak directly with Marianne. The recording will capture the chat as well and Marianne always reads the chat following our session.

[Participant]: Creativity, Imagination, Emergence

[Participant]: How can God be hidden in the homeless, addicted, abused.... I still cannot process this idea in light of todays urban areas, Gaza and Ukraine. Sigh

[Participant]: Deepak Chopra's book THE THIRD JESUS was remarkable for me. He describes Jesus from his Christian upbringing coupled with his Hindu culture as a provocateur in the sense of disrupting the status quo of thinking.

[Participant]: A teacher of enlightenment, in other words.

[Participant]: Highly recommend The Wisdom Jesus by Cynthia Bourgeault. Closely aligned with what Marianne, Brandon, and Jack are imagining.

[Participant]: Agree about THE WISDOM JESUS.

[Participant]: Jesus the archetype of the interconnection of divine and material or all creation.

[Participant]: Jesus as a very high (the highest?) level of moral development.

[Participant]: I'm not clear about how the world changed between the time before Jesus lived and the time after he lived.

[Participant]: Jesus lures us and all creation beyond morals.

[Participant]: I wonder what action(s) are we being called to at the moment in time when the world seems to be on fire??

[Participant]: What a great presentation, Marianne... thank you.

[Participant] : Thanks!

[Participant]: I think it's important to hold on to/lay claim to Jesus' radical vision of love, of who is worthy (all of us, but especially the least among us), and what it means to care for each other. It's so needed in the world. I really worry that some of the loudest voices speaking about Jesus' don't share this vision. An understatement. We need to proclaim/offer an alternative vision of the possibility of Jesus.

[Participant]: Could we have the Polish poet's name and poem title if possible please?

[Participant]: Is Democracy compatible with having someone in charge?



[Participant]: We need Jesus as a functional ICON. That leads us through the changes, surprised, required....

[Participant] : Jesus is just a moral teacher??

[Participant]: Please post the quote and book on the screen prior to the program today.

[Participant]: Which Phyllis Tickle book is Sheila referring to??

[Participant]: We cannot speak in such generalities about Jesus in modern America.

Fundamentalism and nationalism has replaced Jesus for many.

[Participant]: Which God to "worship"? God is the CREATOR..God is within us...Thomas Merton "You will know God when you know your Truest self".....manifest the depth of our soul...manifest the beauty energy within us..we are mystics in our own right (matthew Fox)..

[Participant]: Tickle says we are changing the question of authority. The church as the authority then it was scripture and looking for the next.

[Participant]: I just finished the Homebrewed Christianity class "Cosmic Christ." Could Marianne get Phil Clayton as a guest? He addresses many of the issues raised today.

[Participant]: Yes, Phil Clayton

[Participant] : Wow... great conversation!

[Participant]: Thank you for emphasizing Jesus Christ as human being.

[Participant]: If I had no knowledge of Jesus or other religious figures what would be my anchor and guide my life? I would be empty of the unknown knowns that exist but are not seen by me.

So then what? How would I define values that are worthy of consideration? Is collective wellbeing the goal?

[Participant]: Jesus had time in the desert, Siddhartha Buddha had time under the Bodhi Tree

[Participant]: Alfred Whitehead talks of God as creativity.

[Participant]: I appreciate a rhythm of Awaken - Risk - Bless. Evolve our individual and collective consciousness (Christ/Non-dual consciousness) - Engage with the social justice and environmental issues that keep many on the margins - Bless speaks for itself.

[Participant]: Thanks, Janet. That is really a helpful point, about worship.

[Participant]: That is helpful to view Jesus as a window to the Divine.

[Participant] : Unity in Diversity

[Participant]: Just to play devil's advocate: Bureaucracy and structure is one way of anchoring a conversation - giving it consistent being in the world. Perhaps our problem is that we conflate God and Jesus with the bureaucracy and the structure? If we could hold our "sacred" church bureaucracy as NOT SACRED, but human, and hold it lightly, and acknowledge its frailty - perhaps that would make something possible.

[Participant]: the world is still in creation and we are part of this creative Spirits..

[Participant]: I just want to say that I still grieve that Marcus Borg is gone. I love it that you are carrying on his legacy.

[Participant]: For me, I think that the bureaucracy comes out of our need to be sure about something- to know, to codify, to tie down - and deconstruction is an antidote to that - to continually hold open the question, to give up having to know, over and over again.

membership. Only if they chose that. Motive not to convert, but assist them at their level..

[Participant]: Yes, following Jesus is more important than worshipping Jesus for me. It seems to me that in the sacramental Eucharistic celebration we tend to idolize Jesus. I ask if Jesus in really present and we accept that then what do we do with that? How to we take the Real Presence into our daily living? Secondly, God is love is not a feeling. Rather it is an action. Everything in the cosmos is subject to the physical and mystical laws of attraction. Knowing that I would ask why does love exist?
